School Name: John Bartram High School
Grades: 9-12
Grant Amount: \$5,000
Project Title: Bartram Arts Through Gardens
Community Partners: Farm at Bartram's Garden, Women Against Abuse, Mighty Wrighter

Project Description: Our project will bring our community together by integrating arts with our thriving gardening program. We will develop a theater arts project about an important leader in agriculture and botany- George Washington Carver, exploring his life through song, rap and musical interludes. Will will also incorporate poetry, rap, song, and video about the life surrounding the gardens.

Project Title: Living Mural and Garden
Community Partners: Trustees of the Lower Dublin Academy and Stephen Wasielewski

Project Description: Project will include a mixed media indoor mural as well as a "Living Painting" outdoor garden, around the theme of "Indigenous Life and Waterways of Northeast Philadelphia." The mural will depict a scene from the woods of the Poquessing Creek, including indigenous wildlife. The ceramic portions will include smaller wildlife and greenery.

Project Title: Narrative as Soft Sculpture
Community Partners: Fleisher Art Memorial, Fabric Workshop + Museum
Project Description: Spring residency for 5th/8th grade students to explore narrative and storytelling through printmaking + textile arts with Philadelphia--based artist Sinead Cahill.

Students will have hands on exposure to developing story boards. They will incorporate english writing and spelling, social studies, math, and technology. The goal is for students to think about the consequences of violence, it's impact on them as individuals and on society as a whole.

Project Description: Project will build literacy learning among participants, nearly 25% of are ELL students. The project will explore hand drumming practices and poetry from around the world. Students will work with COSACOSA spoken word artists to create original poetry and song lyrics exploring their cultural histories and their hopes for the future. Working with Music Specialist Chris Argerakis and composer/producer Rodney Whittenberg from MelodyVision, students will develop rhythmic accompaniments for their writings, and perform and record an album of original songs and spoken work pieces.

Project Title: American Dreams

Community Partners: CosaCosa, Passyunk Sq. Civic. Assoc.

Project Description: Through the American Dreams project, 8th grade students will collect & explore connections among immigrant stories from their families, their school, and their neighborhood. Students will be challenged to envision, create, and promote a major project that will require a variety of literacy, art-making, and technical skills. More than 30 different ethnicities currently are represented at Kirkbride, and many students are new immigrants. Collaborating w/ artists from COSACOSA, students will devise new ways to tell old tales while creating cross-cultural connections through multiple artistic disciplines – creative writing, audio art, and ceramic/mosaic art.

Project Title: Giggles and Slam, Poetry Jam
Community Partners: Young Audiences New Jersey & Eastern Pennsylvania
Project Description: This Poetry & Percussion residency begins with a school-wide performance during which students are introduced to the concept of combining poetry and drumming. Students will explore the power of rhythms and words and explore their interconnectedness. When these tools are combined, the power to tell a story and express yourself becomes art. Students will learn how to play and compose "rhythm poems," which will be performed for the school community.
